It was a big production.

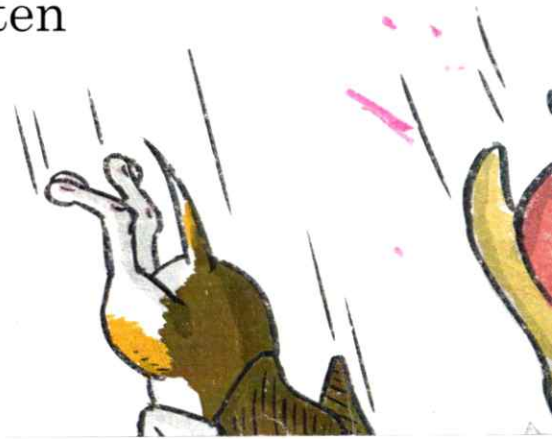
Something was missing, though.
