



Subject and object pronouns
are used for different things.

Subject pronouns are for grammar subjects.

I, you, he, she, they, it, we, you, they

Object pronouns are for grammar objects.

me, you, him, her, them, it, us, you, them

You must memorize
these two groups of pronouns.

Repeat them until
they will be in your mind forever.

We will discuss this later,
but notice the pronouns
in this sentence:

I saw him, and he saw me,
but she gave him and her the tomatoes.



There are other kinds of pronouns, too.

We use **demonstrative** pronouns
to demonstrate:

this, that, these, those

This is a good bridge.

We use **possessive** pronouns
to show possession:

*mine, yours, his, hers, theirs, its, * ours, theirs*

Mine is hand-carved.

We use **interrogative** pronouns
to interrogate:

who, whose, whom, which, what

Who rode the bus today?

* Note: *My, your, his, her, their, its, our, your, and their* are possessive **adjectives**. We will discuss them in the adjective section. The word *its* with no apostrophe is either a possessive pronoun or a possessive adjective; the word *it's* with an apostrophe is a contraction of *it is*.
