



Each group of words with a subject
and a predicate in it
is called a *clause*.

The **grocer arranged** the vegetables neatly.

This is a clause because it has a subject,
the noun *grocer*, and a predicate,
the verb *arranged*.

All of the other words
are also part of the clause.
They go with their subject and predicate.

Sometimes we connect
one subject and predicate
to another subject and predicate
to make a big double sentence!

The **grocer arranged** the vegetables,
but **Sue arranged** the fruit.
