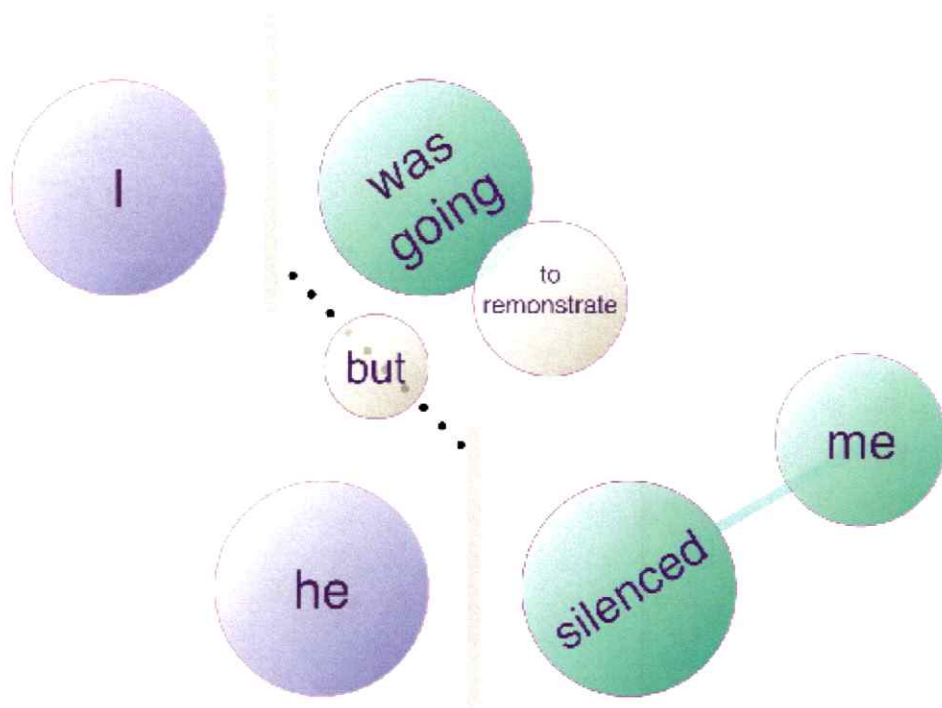


If we compare these noun clause sentences with another I,ccI compound sentence, two independent clauses joined by a comma and coordinating conjunction, we see how different the logic is. Here is a standard compound sentence from Herman Melville's *Moby Dick*: "I was going to remonstrate, but he silenced me."



I was going to remonstrate, but he silenced me.

to remonstrate is an infinitive, but there are no phrases

To remonstrate is to protest forcefully. Notice that the infinitive *to remonstrate* acts here as an adverb. The words *I was going* do not have a transitive impact on the infinitive.
